An excavator crashed through the window of Philadelphia's public-access television station Friday afternoon, sending glass and debris into the street.

The incident happened shortly after noon at the PhillyCAM studio, located at 699 Ranstead St. in Center City, police said.

A construction firm was doing street work when an excavator struck the side of the building, shattering a large glass window and knocking bricks from the façade before coming to a rest inside a common area.

"It sounded like a huge explosion," said PhillyCAM executive director Gretjen Clausing, who was sitting in her office when she heard the impact.



# the stacks

1927 — stacks built for 800,000 books

BOOKSTACK CONVERSION CONCEPT: EXISTING STACK DESCRIPTION


A self-supporting structure within a 50' wide by 170' long by 55' high space. The structure is comprised of angle iron built sort of like an erector set with 6 levels of shelving and 11/4" thick inlaid stone flooring that adds stability. This structure can literally be unbolted to dismantle it. The stone is Tennessee Pink marble - 14,00sf wer reclaimed and fabricated for new stairs and hallways. This bookstack structure can hold more than 800,000 items. Heating is done with radiators, air flow is from basement under the stacks that passes up through the base of each shelving unit. The HVAC ducting under the stacks was leaking and in need of repair. Abatement is required under the stacks to remove duct insulation so repair work can be done. There are 2 elevators in the stacks that work but are in need of repair.

The historic photo to the right shows the structure of the bookstacks before flooring and shelving was installed. The lighting in the stacks is antiquated with push button style controls. All shelving is


metal and could not

> be reused when removed. Of the 6 levels only two connect to occupied floors - stack level 4 connects to the 1st floor and stack level 2 connects



When the renovations began in Parkway Central in 2006 only 33% of the building was open to the public. After Phase 3 nearly 65% will be available for










### The Undoing Process

- 2006-08 Stacks concept developed
- 2011-13 locate, lease and build new book storage at Pennovation warehouse
- 2013-14 move 800,000 books
- 2014-16 plan the stacks Phase 3 project
- 2015-16 move 200 staff to accommodate construction
- Feb 2017 begin "enabling" phase of construction
- Jan 2019 construction complete
- April 2019 grand opening




